Bringing the past alive



Most of Florida's fishing villages are lost in history. But Cortez Village is still a working fishing community with boatyards and fisheries, original 1920s-era bungalows and quaint dockside fish joints. Despite that, many of the folk skills and heritage crafts of the people who lived here are at risk of being forgotten. That's why the Florida Maritime Museum, which collects, preserves and shares traditional knowledge, cultural artifacts and stories specific to Florida's fishing and maritime heritage, recently opened the Folk School at Florida Maritime

Museum. "People can come here to learn new skills and refresh old ones," says Kristin Sweeting, the museum's supervisor. "We all crave a connection to the past and seek experiential education, authenticity and hands-on experiences." There will be plenty of that at the school, which offers regular classes (including net mending, fish filleting, papermaking, memoir writing and canning) and also provides a "supportive environment where anyone can learn skills, share stories and participate in preserving a vanishing culture."
